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Principal's Notes

Dear Families,

I hope you are well. It has been a busy first week back at school! As I sit and write this on Friday morning, our Year 11 students are in the middle of their first written mock exam—English. Their attendance has been excellent, and they are all working hard, writing diligently on their exam papers. We are incredibly proud of their dedication and focus during this important time.

Parking

For those of you who collect your children from school, you will be aware that our staff voluntarily perform a crossing duty, as Hilton Lane is an incredibly busy road. Our priority is ensuring that all children can cross safely. Please may I remind parents not to park on the crossing. The zigzag lines mark this area for safety reasons. Additionally, local residents have kindly asked that parents avoid parking in front of their driveways. We understand that it can be difficult to find a safe parking space on Hilton Lane, but we appreciate your cooperation in parking responsibly. Thank you for your support in keeping our students and the wider community safe.

Academic Reviews

Recently, we have held our first Academic Review evenings for Years 7, 8, and 9. We hope that those of you who attended found them useful. As a reminder, these evenings replace the traditional parents' evening in the school hall, providing a more personalised approach to discussing students' progress.

Uniform Standards

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Lowry Line Standards

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope this letter finds you well.

Over the half term break, you will have received information about our updated detention system. This letter aims to give you further information about this.

Our new detention system begins on Thursday 6th March 2025; where we consolidate our whole school detentions into a single, central system. This allows us to clearly communicate detentions to both students and families, helping to prevent further escalations.

All Thursday detentions will be communicated to parents by 4pm on Tuesday of the same week. We hope that by allowing a good period of notice, you can support your child to attend detention.

A detention is issued only when a student breaches our Lowry Line standards more than once. These detentions may be given for the following reasons:

1. Lateness to school (after 8:27 AM)

Punctuality is essential as important messages are often shared at the start of the day. However, we understand that some students do travel a distance to us and on occasions, issues with public transport may arise. If a student is late because of public transport, we will take this into account.

2. Uniform

We strive to support students in meeting uniform expectations. We have spare uniform available and if an issue can be resolved before they enter the main building, no sanction is applied. However, if a student enters with incorrect uniform, a sanction will apply. Uniform plays a key role in our school identity and reinforces our high standards.

The first time a student does not meet either of these standards, we simply log this, remind them of our standards – no detention is issued.

A detention is only issued the second time a student does not meet these standards. If a student repeatedly fails to be punctual and wear correct uniform and has already been given a detention, they may be placed in our Reflection Room.

We appreciate your support in ensuring your child attends their detention, as we believe this system is both clear and fair. In rare cases where an unavoidable medical appointment clashes with detention, we may request medical evidence. If a student misses the detention due to illness, it will roll over to the next week. 
